Course Overview:

This course will develop language competence and communication skills, as well as social, aesthetic and cultural literacy through active engagement with text, both fiction and non-fiction.

What students will learn in Y1 Lang & Lit

The course is designed to help students achieve these four aims:

- Develop an understanding of how ‘meaning’ is negotiated between texts, readers, writers and contexts.
- Develop one’s ability to interpret, analyze and evaluate a range of texts.
- Develop one’s powers of expression.
- Develop a lifelong appreciation of language and literature.

Students must always credit where they have got the information used, both in the body of the written work and on the Works Cited page at the end, using the correct referencing format.

Student's Responsibility:
